The Kilted Man appears at the Converse County Library Saturday, March 12 at 6:30 pm for an evening of Celtic music. Admission is free for the musical program.

Formerly with The Muses, who have appeared twice previously at the library, Gurnsey is now performing solo after a tragic accident in 2009 brought about the break up of the group.

His performance features a variety of instruments and an enthusiasm that breathes new life into this



traditional music venue. He adds new life to old songs as well as adding original material to the Celtic repertoire.

Matthew has performed east to west, north to south across the United States. He performs with a ferocity and a strength of heart that embodies the music so many people hold dear.

Cadillac Cowboy Songwriter to Appear at Library

Chuck Pyle, an accomplished songwriter, whose songs have been recorded by John Denver, The Nitty Gritty Dirt Band and Suzy Bogguss will appear at the Converse County Library on Saturday, April 2 at 11:00 AM.

Pyle has won high praise from both fans and peers alike throughout an inspired performance career of over 40 years. When reviewers first gave him the "Zen Cowboy" moniker, he decided to, as he says, "Always ride the horse in the direction it's going," and took the nickname to heart, shaving his head and blending his upbeat perspective with old-

fashioned horse sense. He mixes infectiously hummable melodies with straight-from-the-saddle poetry, quoting bumper stickers, proverbs, world leaders and old cowboys.

Country fans know him best for writing, "Cadillac Cowboy", recorded by the late Chris LeDoux, and "Jaded Lover", recorded by Jerry Jeff Walker.

While fans love his recordings, they adore Chuck's live performance. A nimble guitarist, critics say his sense of rhythm is more like a fine classical, or jazz, soloist, his songwriting musically sophisticated yet full of uncluttered space.





Summer and reading. Beautiful weather, sunny days, vacation--a perfect time to spend with a book. Research shows that students who don't read over the summer lose critical reading skills. Parents, teachers, caregivers and other adults should encourage children to read through the summer months and a summer reading program is one of the best ways to nurture and sustain reading skills.

Enroll your child in your library's summer reading program. Check out books that match your child's reading level and interest. Here's a quick test called the five-finger rule. Ask your child to read 100 words from a book. Have your child raise one finger for each word that is too difficult to figure out. If more than five fingers go up, the book is probably too hard. Let children choose books that interest them, but find a reading level which is challenging but not frustrating. Get involved and work with your child: ask questions about the story and allow your child to ask questions; summarize or ask your child to summarize; reread hard-to-understand passages. Take part in the crafts, programs, and associated activities to make the experience fun.
